There is an Appendix to this exhibition which includes some extra photographic material that we collected. Although this did not become paintings, we have included it for general interest.























We collected a lot of photographic reference material on this project, too much to convert all into paintings


In this last section we have included some of the more unusual and sometimes challenging photographs









We noticed that some stone bridges on the underside had courses of stones running parallel to the ground See next picture



On some bridges the courses of stone ran diagonally Why the difference ? The answer is on the next page



The answer is that the diagonal stone courses are on a Skew Bridge, ie., one that crosses the canal at other than 90 degrees to the line of the canal, see above

Then the alignment of the face arch stones at 90 degrees to the arch face dictates that the following courses run diagonally

Very clever stone masons !!
